Public Transportation

You can buy a ticket at the Ticket machine or online: <https://int.bahn.de/en>

Pay attention to which trains you are allowed on with your ticket. The „normal“ fare generally does not include speed trains such as (IC and ICE = „the white ones“; EC).

HBF (Hauptbahnhof) means Central Station
The Terminal Station of the trains can be found in the following brackets. These stations assist in guiding you in the correct direction.

From Dusseldorf Airport to Wuppertal Central Station

Dusseldorf Airport has two stations available. You have the option to use both of them in order to reach Dusseldorf Main Station (Düsseldorf HBF), where you will need to switch trains to continue on to Wuppertal Central Station (Wuppertal HBF)..

Düsseldorf Flughafen Terminal (S) – Düsseldorf HBF

- Located at the deep floor.
- You can only take the S11 (Bergisch Gladb.) line. It is expected to reach Dusseldorf HBF (Main Station) after 12 minutes and making five stops.

D-Flughafen Bf. -Düsseldorf HBF

- Located at the final Stop of the „Sky Train“.
- There are several trains available for you to take:
 - S1 (Solingen HBF);
 - RE1 (Aachen HBF);
 - RE2 (Düsseldorf HBF);
 - RE3 (Düsseldorf HBF);
 - RE5 (Koblenz HBF);
 - RE6 (Flughafen Köln/Bonn Bf.);
 - RE19 (Düsseldorf HBF)

to Düsseldorf HBF.

Please Note: There are some IC/ICE that depart for Düsseldorf HBF too, but those might not be included in your ticket.

Düsseldorf HBF to Wuppertal HBF

From Düsseldorf HBF there are some trains that you can take to Wuppertal HBF.

- S8 (Hagen HBF)
- RE4 (Dortmund HBF)
- RE13 (Hamm (Westf.))

From Frankfurt Airport to Wuppertal Central Station

There are two options to get to Wuppertal HBF from Frankfurt Airport (Frankfurt am Main Flughafen Fernbahnhof)

Frankfurt am Main Flughafen Fernbahnhof – Wuppertal HBF
Some trains run through to the station, which are IC/ICEs. The costs are approximately 18 to 40 Euros.

Direct connections are such as:

- ICE bound to Münster (Westf) HBF)
- IC bound to (Bielefeld HBF)
- Some ICE bound to (Dortmund HBF)

Frankfurt am Main Flughafen Fernbahnhof – Köln Messe Deutz or Köln HBF – Wuppertal HBF

There are some ICEs you can take but you ´ll need to change the train in Köln Messe Deutz or Köln HBF.

Köln HBF (or Messe Deutz) – Wuppertal HBF

- RB48 (Wuppertal Oberbarmen)
- RE7 (Rheine)

There are some IC/ICE that depart for Wuppertal HBF, which could be included in your ticket

From Cologne Airport (Flughafen Köln/Bonn Bf.) to Wuppertal HBF

You have to get the train to Cologne Main Station (Köln HBF) to switch the train to Wuppertal HBF.

Flughafen Köln/Bonn Bf. – Köln HBF

You can take either of the following trains to get to Cologne Central Station

- S19 (Düren)
- RB27 (Mönchengladbach)
- RE6 (Minden (Westf.))

Köln HBF – Wuppertal HBF

- RB48 (Wuppertal Oberbarmen)
- RE7 (Rheine)

There are some IC/ICE that depart for Wuppertal HBF, but those might not be included in your ticket.

The inner City of Elberfeld

What to see

Historically, Wuppertal as a City wasn't unified until 1929. So it consists of the once independent cities of Elberfeld, Barmen, Ronsdorf, Cronenberg and Vohwinkel

If you have some time to spend you could visit the District „Brill“ or Briller Viertel, which is one of the largest Wilhelminian-style villa neighbourhoods in Germany



The suspension monorail – Wuppertal's landmark – travels 13 km through the city. The network runs mainly above the city's river Wupper, only four of the 20 stops run above solid ground. More than 80,000 people use the suspension monorail daily. It is therefore an everyday means of transport for the city's inhabitants, but also a popular tourist attraction. Many sights can easily be reached on foot from the 20 suspension railway stations. Since August 1st, 2019, only the new 'Generation 15' railcars have been in service.

One of the most interesting sights in Wuppertal: The Engels House breathes the spirit of a great historical figure: Friedrich Engels (1820-1895). The Engels House, built in 1775, was his grandfather's home and represents the family's economic success as textile entrepreneurs during early industrialization.



Paul Rudolf Carnap (* May 18, 1891 in Ronsdorf, today a district of Wuppertal) was a German philosopher and one of the main representatives of logical empiricism. Carnap's birthplace, the so-called Villa Carnap, is now located in Ronsdorf in the street In der Krim, house number 42, near the Ronsdorfer park.



The Nordbahntrasse in Wuppertal is an approximately 22 km long, wide footpath, cycle path and inline skating trail on the former railway lines 2423 (Rheinische Strecke) and 2713 (Kohlenbahn).



Where to eat

There are some great Restaurants in Wuppertal. The short overview just offers a few inspirations if you plan to go out close to the proposed hotels. If you fancy a drink, the so-called District „Luisenviertel“ (in English this would be Luise's neighborhood) is the right place to be.
